HMS Ganges update | We need your help please

As you know, the Parish Council has made an application for Judicial Review on the decision by Babergh District Council to grant planning permission for building 285 houses etc. on the former HMS Ganges site at Shotley Gate. The application has been approved by the Hon Mrs Justice Lang who has given permission for our case to go forward to a full two day hearing saying that there are "*arguable grounds in respect of a difficult planning decision*". Shortly a date will be set for the court hearing and we will let you know more as and when we do.

Help with our legal costs

Now that we have reached the full hearing stage, the Parish Council wants to secure as much financial help as possible from the residents of Woolverstone and others from the Peninsula. Whilst we are confident that our application will be successful, win or lose we will have a sizable legal bill to pay. Already our solicitor and barrister has completed considerable case preparation and there is more to do to prepare for the two day High Court hearing. So far we have also had to pay over £900 in court fees.

If we win, so far as possible, we will ask for our legal costs to be paid by Babergh District Council. If we are not successful with our application, the High Court has already capped our liability to the Council at no more than $\pounds 10,000$. This is because the court agrees we are bringing a valid claim that is concerned with the quality of our environment which a planning issue could greatly harm.

Members of the Parish Council have pledged £500 each to help pay for the first stage of our application and we have had a £500 donation from Freston Parish Council, which we are immensely grateful. These funds together with Woolverstone Parish Council's reserve funds has helped get us this far.

Would you like to help, please?

We are immensely grateful for the financial help we have already received or been promised. However, we will need solid support from residents within Woolverstone as well as friends and supporters from outside the village. Just imagine the impact on our lives and homes if HMS Ganges is built, not only over the five years of construction but for ever after all the new houses have been built. All the construction traffic and new residents will have to drive along our part of the B1456 to HMS Ganges.

Help by giving us a pledge

Over the next two weeks you will receive a letter from Woolverstone Parish Council to explain how you can make a financial pledge towards our legal costs for our claim against Babergh District Council. Each pledge will help fund the litigation that seeks to stop the substantial increase in traffic and noise through our village.

Help by attending our fundraising events

We are also planning to hold a variety of fundraising events which will also help raise funds.

Including all the village within the 30 mph zone

It has always seemed incredibly unfair that part of Woolverstone village is outside the 30 mph zone. Cars are travelling up to or above the national speed limit past these seven houses making entering and exiting houses dangerous. There is no footpath. The road twists and makes visibility very poor. Peter Patrick - one of our District Councillors – gave up leafleting along this stretch. He felt it was too dangerous. The Parish Council has been seeking the support of David Wood - our Suffolk County Councillor – for years to have this situation changed. Recently the process for change at Suffolk County Council has changed and become more democratic. There is now a "Speed Limit Panel" to whom we can make representation for change.

Call for your evidence

A few weeks ago we had a meeting with David. He promised to support our application to have the entire village within the 30 mph zone. We now have to present evidence to support our case. This should be letters from the residents, service providers (e.g. postman), Police, Parish Council, information from the village questionnaire and so on. We are aiming to have collected this evidence in time for an application in May or June. Please help with making our case if you have an experience of the difficulties at the East end of our village. Write a letter showing your concerns and reasons. Please send it to me, Simon Pearce.

Woolverstone Statement

Woolverstone Parish Council's response to the Statement from Shotley Parish Council dated 7 March 2016

Woolverstone has always supported redevelopment of the Ganges site but only on an appropriate scale. We believe 285 new houses, a hotel, care home and business units in addition to the Marina development of 150 houses will overwhelm the B1456 - the only route in an out of the peninsula - causing unacceptable environmental damage to an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and our designated conservation village. The planning process has been protracted because of the determination of the developer to build so many homes at a location classified as "non-sustainable", on the tip of a peninsula at the end of a 8.5 mile narrow, twisting road passing through four communities. The original plan to build 500 houses was reduced to 325 but we fought and won a Public Inquiry in 2006 when the Secretary of State rejected the scheme pointing out:

" the inaccessible, unsustainable nature of the proposal site and the harm to the environment arising from the increase in traffic that would be generated . . . the site is not within an urban area, nor is it an urban extension nor is it located around any node in a good public corridor."

The current plans do not address the criteria for sustainability nor take into account how they will affect neighbouring villages. We welcome Shotley Parish Council's willingness to work with us to mitigate the impacts of the increase in traffic but do not believe any meaningful mitigation is possible. The provision of "sensitively designed white gates" at either end of the village is derisory. No clear figures of the total traffic generation have been shared with us although it is described as "substantial" and "significant." We understand from the developer's figures the increase will be up to 38% - a huge number of additional vehicles on the road making over 3000 extra trips a day. Such an impact is comparable to that of the scheme rejected in 2006 and remains unacceptable.

The Government is keen to see houses being built; it is also keen to ensure they are built in sustainable locations. The homes provided by the Ganges development are not even needed for Babergh to meet its housing targets. We agree with Shotley Parish Council that an acceptable and sustainable solution should be found for the site and have consistently said so at many consultations but such a massive scheme is neither.

Nor does Woolverstone PC believe the current proposal is the "best" that could be achieved for the site or the communities along the B1456. We fundamentally disagree with the view expressed in Shotley's statement regarding the Section 106 monies. The guaranteed sum is \pounds 1,079,480 phased over the period of construction, nearly half of this destined for education. Any further monies to be obtained,

potentially up to £5.984 million, depend on the viability and profitability (20%) of the project. There are to be three valuation points to assess these. Only if the valuations show viability and a profit over 20% will additional monies become available. There is no certainty that the project will be sufficiently profitable to trigger any extra payments. Furthermore, it is really hard to see the "rewards" of such a development to the villages along the B1456 and the wider community.

Shotley Gate is at the end of a long winding road passing through four communities - Wherstead, Freston, Woolverstone and Chelmondiston. It is surrounded on all sides by an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Its classification as a "non-sustainable location" has not stopped it becoming a vibrant community and to be congratulated on becoming "Suffolk Village of the Year 2015". But that village status could soon end. By adding 1,500 to the population, the Ganges and Marina developments would transform Shotley from what is officially a "hinterland settlement" into one of the largest communities in the Babergh District.

All the villages along the B1456, including Shotley until the eleventh hour, objected to the current proposals. Woolverstone, supported by Freston, is now prepared to challenge Babergh's decision at Judicial Review. Previously the Peninsula Parishes Alliance, including Shotley, worked together to protect our unique and beautiful peninsula. We have fought and won before and hope to once again. That said, we embarked on Judicial Review proceedings with a heavy heart. It was not a decision taken lightly but we believe Babergh made an error in law and that the scale of the development is simply too large and damaging to go unchallenged. A High Court judge has now decided that we do have an arguable case.

We agree with Shotley Parish Council that change is inevitable. But we believe that what we are facing would degrade and destroy our environment irrevocably for all time, for our children and grandchildren. There is nothing "sympathetic" about the increased volume of traffic, danger, noise, vibration, emissions and community severance.

The Shotley Peninsula is a very special place with tranquil countryside running gently down to the banks of two glorious rivers. There are moves afoot for the interior of the peninsula to be added to the AONB so protecting it from the ravages of future development. Our hope is that all the communities of the Peninsula will once again work together to protect its rare beauty and character for posterity.
