Fibre Broadband

Paul Rogers, along with Robert Wildbore, has been working hard to connect more of the village to fibre broadband. Here is where we are at the moment:

BT and Openreach have looked at the scope and promised to include FTTP (fibre to property) for residents on Exchange Only lines as part of the next phase. This is targeted but not promised to complete by end of the year and we are assured is now a priority. However, this does not include the whole village. The scope as described by the Openreach Project Manager is as follows:

"The main concentration of the network and the fibre nodes (where properties can connect to) will be along Main Street from Harkstead Lane, east to Old Police House/ Crosswinds. It will

also connect up Manning's Lane. There is more network further east again at the west part of Chelmondiston and the area around Shotley Common."

This may leave some Woolverstone residents not included in the area above still without fibre broadband. If they would like to email me I will provide contact details of senior people at BT/Openreach they can chase directly to push for inclusion.

In the meantime I will be checking in with Openreach on a regular basis to ensure there are no big delays to this.

The scope they outlined is for the new project only. Some residents are already covered and should be able to get fibre broadband now.

You will then see a status under "Fibre Journey":

- If it states "Accepting Orders" then you are already covered.
- If it states "In Scope" then you are likely covered by the new project or a subsequent one (which will be delivered later).
- If it states "We are exploring solutions" there is no project or funding.

The "We are exploring solutions" is where we were many months ago and really means they have no plan at the moment that includes your property. If you are at that stage then I think time to chase BT/Openreach.

Centenary of the end of World War One

On 8th November there will a commemoration at the grave of Private W. S. Foreman in St Michael's churchyard; the only War Graves Commission grave in Woolverstone. Further details will be posted in November's newsletter.

11th November 2018 marks the centenary of the signing of the Armistice that marked the end of World War 1. As a village, we plan to mark this special anniversary in a number of ways.

There will be a Service of Remembrance at St Michael's followed by an Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial outside Berners Hall.

In the evening, there will be a "Battle's Over" Beacon of Light commemoration on the lawns of Ipswich High School with the village sharing with the High School. This ceremony will be repeated in over a thousand communities across the country. The High School will be open to village at 18.20. Please ensure to arrive by 18.30. There will be a tribute at 18.50 followed by bugle sounding the "Last Post". Beacon will be lit promptly at 19.00.

During the weekend it is planned that there will be an exhibition of information and photographs about Woolverstone's role in WW1 and its naval connections which will be located in St Michaels' Church for a week from Monday 5th November.

To summarise:

Events: Church service at St Michael's 10.00 and Service of Remembrance at our village War Memorial 11.00 and "Battles Over" beacon and "Last Post" shared with Ipswich High School 7.00 pm in Ipswich High School grounds.

Exhibition to include: WW1 Memorial to the Fallen and "Woolverstone Park Hospital" in St Michael's church from Monday 5th November.

We would really like to have family information and pictures that would help complete the story for each serviceman from Woolverstone that gave his life in WW1. This would help them be so much more than names on the brass plaque in the Church or on the Woolverstone's War Memorial outside Berners Hall.
