Dear All

The photograph above is of the sunset in Woolverstone on 21st December, the shortest day, or so I thought. Actually, this year the shortest day fell on 22nd December not 21st; the first time it had done so in a number of years. For the inquisitive, the 22nd December was fractionally shorter by only one second lasting 7 hours, 49 minutes and 43 seconds. (The previous day it had been 7:49:44)

But, that got me thinking. The evenings had been lengthening since December 12th; it is the sunrise time that keeps getting later making the day shorter. In fact, it is not until January 2nd that the sunrise starts rolling backwards again and our day gets longer from both ends.

The unseasonably mild and damp winter thus far is having a profound effect in the garden. Roses are still flowering. Snowdrops have started to bloom early. Our white camellia, which ordinarily loses its blossoms to frost, is clothed in a perfect spray of bright white flowers.

Our seasons seem to be changing. Many of our trees didn't lose their leaves until December. Plants seem to be flowering earlier, birds to be nesting earlier as our warmer weather extends at both ends of the year. A few weeks ago, a conversation with a fisherman in Aldeburgh revealed the extent to which his catch has changed in recent years with species he rarely saw latterly becoming quite common, seeing entirely new species to these waters as well as others becoming scarce.

Perhaps our New Year Resolutions should include one about what we can do, individually and collectively, to help our natural world as temperatures rise?
