The exquisitely fragile, nodding heads of snowdrops are among the most loved flowers of Spring and often the first to bloom. They are immensely hardy and can survive in cold and snow. They are also bearers of a promise that the earth is awakening after its winter sleep. Greek myth tells us that Persephone, Queen of the Underworld and the goddess of vegetation, carried Snowdrops on her return from Hades to our world in Spring. The snowdrops she carried brought back life to a barren, wintery landscape, but they also bear a hint of the Underworld they came from. Hence it is considered unlucky to pick them and bring them into the house!

Snowdrops are also known as the "Fair Maid of February" or "Candlemas bells". Candlemas, a quarter day, falls on February 2nd but this year snowdrops have been flowering since St Paul's Day on 25th January and perhaps earlier. However, either date marks a point roughly halfway through Winter. Although we may have more cold weather to come, the excitement of Spring is building.

Dairy House

Babergh planners recently gave planning permission to Ipswich High school for the change of use of the Dairy House, the conversion of the current barns, demolition of garages, plus the construction of an additional barn-like structure which will provide boarding accommodation for up to 55 students and associated staff. The aim is to be ready for the first boarders, numbering around 15, this coming September.

Horsepond's Green

The working party on Horsepond's Green have had their first Saturday meeting. The hedge that fronts the road opposite "The Forge" has been cut and cleared of brambles.
