It has been a wonderful year for flowering shrubs and blossom. The kind early spring weather meant that blossoms survived well until storm Hannah blew them away over the weekend. Lack of severe weather meant that Camellias and Magnolias looked particularly magnificent over a long period.

But, the soil is very short of water and we could really do with some long periods of soaking rain over the next few weeks. The irrigation pond below the Hall looked to be at the lowest level I have seen it, during this season, for many years. The foliage of the spectacular bluebells in Freston Wood lay limply on the ground as if trampled over with their flower stalks encouraged into tall thin growth by the unseasonal warmth. But they still looked a wonderful picture.

Our House Martins, one of the joys of life, arrived a week early on 25th April chattering and whirling around the cottages celebrating their safe return after a journey of thousands of miles. Almost as soon as they had arrived, they disappeared to further fresh water wetlands to feed, rebuild their strength and get ready for nesting. They'll be back. Shakespeare describes the House Martin as: "This guest of summer".

Parish News

Informative village meeting on 4th April 2019 at 7.30 pm in Berners Hall

Over 60 people attended the open meeting in Berners Hall for a presentation about plans for proposed development within Woolverstone by Geffrey Mayhew and Roger Balmer Design.

There was an opportunity to view a map with proposed locations for builds, the number and type of builds. However, there was no information about the proposed design of houses.

Many people left quick comments on our SWOT sheets and 17 people emailed more detailed responses which are attached to the email version.

The Parish Council discussed next steps and will identify key themes within the responses. It is proposed that in addition to the village survey undertaken two years ago there will be a Housing Needs Survey undertaken in the next two months.

I was able to retain the location map following the village meeting. It will be available from 7.00 pm at Berners Hall on Thursday 9th May prior to the Parish Council meeting at 7.30, along with the detailed comments received so far. If anyone would like to view it before then, please make contact and I'm sure we can arrange something.

At the moment this does not have the status of an application.

Nominations for the Parish Council Elections 2019

Two Councillors stepped down from the Parish Council at the 2019 elections. Simon Quantrill is moving to Holbrook and Mark Bostock is heavily involved on the City of London Corporation. We thank them for their service to the village over many years. The elections were uncontested.

We have gained two new Councillors: Jon Mann and Matthew March. We thank them for committing their time and energy to the future of our village.

We are supposed to have nine Parish Councillors, but currently the team is comprised of only eight. Following our meeting in May we will be able to seek a further member of the community to join the team working for the interests of Woolverstone.
