Dear All

Spring is nearly here! And it seems to have been blown here on rather blustery westerly winds from across the Atlantic. Mercifully, we have avoided the worst of both storms, even managing to keep our electricity, although we did witness the Strand being flooded on numerous occasions. I suspect this is something we can expect to see more of in the future.

On the first day of February I paused to listen to a single Sky Lark's soaring song on the fields behind us, perhaps two weeks earlier than usual. The leaves on the Blackthorn by Horsepond's Green were emerging, also weeks earlier than usual. We must hope that this fervency of Nature is not caught out by a return to shivering Artic conditions.

The days are lengthening more quickly now, in fact by almost 4 minutes a day. Since February began, the day has lengthened by just over an hour and a half over the month. Increased light, alone, produces such change but combined with temperatures rising the furious dance of Spring is ready to burst into our lives.

We are expecting the Planning Application from Geoff Mayhew Farms for a major development of 22 houses in Woolverstone to be put to Babergh District Council in the very near future. As soon as we have heard I will let you know. The Parish Council intends to hold a second Village meeting so we can share the detail of the proposals with everyone and any changes in what was presented at the previous Village meeting.

Climate and Wildlife Emergency

It is all very well discussing the Climate and Wildlife Emergency we are facing but we have to do something about it, practically. The question is: How can we reduce our impact on the planet?

Obviously, improving our recycling rate is one practical step we can all take. I have attached a copy of the latest Babergh District Council blue bin advice. Please try to get the contents of both bins right. I'm told that including the wrong items can spoil a whole load of material.

Across the UK over a million electrical items are being incinerated or sent to landfill each week. So many of our small electrical items and devices contain materials of which there are limited resources i.e. precious metals and other valuable materials. Circuit boards in electrical items use tiny amounts of gold, silver, palladium and rare earth elements. They also often contain copper steel, aluminium and plastic which can be recovered and turn into new products.

Recycling saves energy and land needed to mine new material and reduces the risk of toxic chemical leaching into surrounding areas.

Why not make a commitment that no more electrical items go into the black bin and that instead they go for recycling. Anything with a plug, battery or cable can be recycled!

I intend to ask the PC to consider offering a facility for villagers to deposit unwanted electrical items to slow this "tsunami of electronic waste". (House of Commons audit committee)

Vestry and Annual Parochial Church Meeting

There are two annual Church meetings a year. The first is the short Vestry Meeting, at which churchwardens are elected; the second is the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). They are usually held one after the other on the same day and at the same place and we always hope that neither meeting will be long. They are followed by a closed meeting of the new PCC which simply elects the PCC officers.

Anybody on the church electoral roll of the parish, and anybody who lives in the parish and is named on the register of local government electors, is entitled to vote in the Vestry meeting. For the APCM only lay persons named on the church electoral roll may attend and take part in the proceedings. The APCM reviews the work of the church in the previous year. We would like to invite you to attend. Details of the meetings will be posted in the church porch about 2 weeks before the meetings.

You are also invited to attend the short service of Morning Prayer beforehand, and we will be providing refreshments in the middle. It will be a good opportunity to pray for the church during the year ahead, and we hope that some of you will consider standing on the PCC, which will give you a real opportunity to be involved in what happens to St Michaels over the coming year.
